## The Chief Example to the Flock

The ministry of a Bishop is to serve as an example to the flock of Christ in life, service, preaching, teaching, discipline, governance, and faithfulness (Phil. 3:17). Clergy and Laity look to their Bishop and "the outcome of their way of life" in order to "imitate their faith," recognizing that Bishops are "keeping watch over your souls, as those who will have to give an account" (Heb. 13:7, 17). The Lord has given the Church her ministers in order that the body may be equipped for ministry and mature in Christ (Eph. 4:11-16).

Remembering that "not many of you should become teachers, my brothers, for you know that we who teach will be judged with greater strictness" (Jas. 3:1), a Bishop is always ready to preach, teach, reprove, rebuke, and exhort with apostolic authority (2 Tim 4:1-2). Recognizing the severe judgment promised to shepherds who do not tend the sheep well (Jer. 23:1-4), Bishops shepherd Clergy and Laity, willingly, eagerly, and gently (1 Pet. 5:1-4).

Those who aspire to the office of Bishop desire "a noble task," yet must be "above reproach, the husband of one wife, sober-minded, self-controlled, able to teach, not a drunkard, not violent but gentle, not quarrelsome, not a lover of money..." (1 Tim. 3:1-3). As ambassadors of Christ Jesus (John 20:21), Bishops must feed Christ's sheep with his Word and Sacraments (John 21:15-19), defend them from false doctrine (2 Tim. 3:1-9), encourage leadership as their reverend father in God (2 Tim. 1:2-14), boldly withstand opposition to the Gospel (Acts 4:5-31), and govern the Church with godly integrity (Acts 20:32-35). Thus, the Bishop must in all things rely on the gifts (Isa. 11:2) and fruit (Gal. 5:22-23) of the Spirit, remembering that "it is the Spirit who gives life; the flesh is no help at all" (John 6:63).

This document highlights the five areas of ministry in which a Bishop of Christ's Church must serve: the Chief Missionary, Pastor, Guardian of the Faith, Administrator of Godly Discipline, and Manager of Church Governance. Leading implies knowledge, experience, and skill; and at this level of authority, these must be demonstrated by those who seek Episcopal Office. In each section you will find descriptions of the expectations set by the leadership of the Diocese. These are weighty endeavors which no man in his own strength can hope to fulfill apart from God's grace.

'I am the vine; you are the branches. Whoever abides in me and I in him, he it is that bears much fruit, for apart from me you can do nothing" (John 15:5).







As the Chief Missionary of the Diocese, the Bishop helps the Clergy and Laity of the Diocese advance throughout the region in which God has placed us to seek and save the lost with the good news of Jesus as the Spirit directs us (Acts 16:6-10). The Bishop is responsible for setting an example in his personal life, his shepherding of the diocese, and his leadership within the Province in evangelism, discipleship, and cross-cultural engagement (1 Tim. 4:6-16).


- The Bishop actively engages in evangelism with his friends and neighbors. The challenges that Priests, Deacons, and Laity face in sharing the good news of Jesus are not abstract to our Bishop, but well-known through his own efforts to proclaim Christ crucified.
- Our Bishop helps the diocese make disciples who make disciples. He casts and maintains a clear vision to support deanery expansion through church planting and Local Church growth by helping individuals discern God's missional call in their life, equipping Deacons and Lay Missioners for local mission, helping local leaders identify opportunities for more cross-cultural engagement, providing encouragement, training, and resources for Church Planters, and helping Local Churches to mature their evangelistic efforts.
- The Bishop works with the Canon for Clergy Formation and local Clergy to discern an individual's calling to Holy Orders, determine theological education requirements, further formation after ordination, and deployment within the Diocese for ministry.
- Working alongside the Executive Committee and Treasurer, the Bishop seeks opportunities for fundraising, growth, and advancement for church planting and the Crozier Society.
- Seeking to participate in the unitive work of the Spirit to bind us together as one in Christ, our Bishop serves as an ecumenical representative of the ACNA to other Christian communions.





And so, with regard to their desire, he approves them, but by his precept he alarms them; as if saying plainly, I praise what you seek; but first learn what it is you seek; lest, while you neglect to measure yourselves, your blamefulness appear all the fouler for its haste to be seen by all in the highest place of honor."

Serving as the Chief Pastor of the Diocese, the Bishop must let his gentleness be known to all (Phil. 4:5), operating with spiritual discernment and wisdom to bring peace (Jas. 3:13-18), knowing that the devil is seeking to devour sheep among his fold (1 Pet. 5:1-11).

- The Bishop will continue to pastor his family, regularly meet with his spiritual director, and practice mature spiritual disciplines.
- Our Bishop provides tender oversight to the Clergy and Laity under his cure, listening to, observing, and encouraging them with sensitivity. He interacts respectfully and kindly with clergy who hold theological views that are within the boundaries of orthodoxy in the ACNA, but differ from his own. He is receptive to feedback, seeking harmony when it is possible and lovingly correcting when it is not.
- The Bishop provides collaborative leadership through the mentoring and empowerment of Clergy and Lay Leaders, maturing and encouraging them in the charisms with which God has graced them to act towards the common goals and work of the diocese.
- Working alongside the regional Deans, our Bishop works to foster friendship and collegiality among congregations and clergy.
- During annual visitations to each congregation the Bishop confirms the catechized, encourages and equips Local Church leadership, shows Local Churches how their work is connected to the larger aims of the Deanery and Diocese, and helps encourage and revitalize small and aging Local Churches.



"So everyone who acknowledges me before men, I also will acknowledge before my Father who is in heaven, but whoever denies me before men, I also will deny before my Father who is in heaven. Do not think that I have come to bring peace to the earth. I have not come to bring peace, but a sword. hrough personal example and exhortation to others, the chief guardian of the faith will uphold and contend for the faith that was once for all delivered to the saints (Jude 3), defending it from corruption or novel doctrine contrary to the apostolic Gospel (Gal. 1:8-9).

- The Bishop will be faithful to minister the doctrine, sacraments, and discipline of Christ, as the Lord commanded and as the ACNA has received them.
- Our Bishop will regularly engage in personal prayer, the reading and study of Holy Scripture, and writings of the Church Fathers to hold fast to the truth and correct error. By God's grace he will admonish, teach, and exhort at the Local Church, Diocesan, ACNA West, and Provincial levels.
- The Bishop collaborates and partners with the Bishops of ACNA West for strengthened mission and ministry as well as maintaining and improving the canonical examination and ordination requirements for ordinands as they prepare to serve within the Province.
- The Bishop regularly communicates with Clergy and Laity to maintain godly doctrine and holy living as we seek to evangelize a society that is hostile to the Gospel and Christian ethics. All who preach or celebrate within DWA Local Churches must be licensed by the Bishop and their preaching conform to ACNA doctrinal standards.
- The Bishop will effectively communicate and implement within the Diocese the scholarly work he and the other Bishops have provided regarding how the Church engages current issues within the world's culture.
- The Bishop provides a timely response to charges against Clergy or Lay leaders, manages the investigative process, and administers godly discipline according to Title IV of the <u>ACNA Canons and Constitution</u>, Title II of the <u>DWA Canons and Constitution</u>, and the DWA <u>Ecclesiastial Trial Court Rules of Procedure</u>.





"Woe to the world for temptations to sin! For it is necessary that temptations come, but woe to the one by whom the temptation comes! 

As the chief administrator of godly discipline, the Bishop desires for all to repent and receive forgiveness of sins and healing of body, mind, and spirit through Jesus. Therefore, he must be able, and unwaveringly ready, to decisively and directly confront any heresies, sins, or deviations from Christian and ACNA standards and doctrines found among the Clergy or Laity. His readiness, however, must come from a pastoral heart that loves and genuinely cares for the good of those who must be confronted or disciplined, and for the good of all others who could be harmed by unconfronted or undisciplined sins. The Bishop knows that the Chief Shepherd uses godly discipline to both correct (Matt. 18:15-17) and form (Eph. 4:11-32) those for whom he lovingly shed his blood.


- The Bishop is "above reproach" (Titus 1:7), that is, blameless. His character, work ethic, teaching, and behavior should lead one to gladly follow his example (Phil. 3:17), both within and without the Church (1 Tim. 3:7).
- Allegations of heresy, sexual impropriety, spiritual abuse, or other ethical
  violations among Clergy or Laity will be addressed quickly and thoroughly by
  the Bishop pursuant to Title IV of the <u>ACNA Canons and Constitution</u>, Title
  II of the <u>DWA Canons and Constitution</u>, and the DWA <u>Ecclesiastial Trial</u>
  Court Rules of Procedure.
- Regarding conflict over issues of non-heretical theological disagreement among fellow Bishops, Clergy, and Laity, the Bishop models and sets the expectation that we all honor one another. He reminds Christians that we are united in Christ (Rom. 6:5), despite our inability to always agree on secondary and tertiary matters. These secondary and tertiary matters especially include issues such as Holy Orders and various emphases of the Anglican theological streams.
- In all areas of Godly discipline and conflict, the Bishop remembers to seek first the wisdom of the Chief Shepherd, and secondly the wisdom of his fellow Bishop-shepherds in the ACNA West and College of Bishops as needed.






"Blessed are those servants whom the master finds awake when he comes. Truly, I say to you, he will dress himself for service and have them recline at table, and he will come and serve them... Who then is the faithful and wise manager, whom his master will set over his household, to give them their portion of food at the proper time? ... The Bishop's service as the Chief Manager of Church Governance is both sacramental and constitutional, and his authority derives from an unbroken, personal succession from the twelve Apostles. As St. Paul instructs Timothy, "He must manage his own household well, keeping his children under control with perfect dignity; for if a man does not know how to manage his own household, how can he take care of the church of God?" (1 Tim. 3:4-5)

- The Bishop will have a history of exhibiting emotional and spiritual maturity grounded in an ability to always seek God's authority first. His words and actions will reveal his reliance upon God's leading. He will know how to discern God's voice in the Clergy and Laity that God has placed under his care.
- A godly overseer acknowledges personal weaknesses and willingly seeks support, prioritizing assistance from God and utilizing the <u>resources</u> within his reach. He consistently advocates for optimal utilization of church structures and resources, aligning with God's plan and purposes with obedience.
- The Bishop will understand the ACNA and DWA Constitutions and Canons. He will recognize the challenges and strengths of the ACNA and have a vision of even greater collaboration. He is a bridge-builder among churches, dioceses, the Province, and the worldwide Anglican Communion.
- Through his strategic focus and leadership, the Bishop will cast vision and method for implementation of robust church growth. He will have experience in developing resources for ministry, including financial, as the Diocese looks toward continued movement of our churches from inward maintenance to a culture of missional outreach and expansion through Church Planting and cross cultural mission.
